A word on our Camps...

As you know, the Council is reviewing our property holdings situation. I want to thank that committee for the *absolutely tremendous* job that they did in reviewing our properties, assessing them and then coming up with the presentation that they made to anyone who was interested. I attended the one at BOCES in New Hartford. It was a really well done presentation and it made our situation and the need for action, in my opinion, crystal clear.

We as adult leaders, both the paid and the volunteers, have a stewardship duty over all our council's assets. We have to manage them in a manner that is prudent and meets the needs of the program both now and into the future. I will not repeat the findings of the Committee here as everyone had an opportunity to attend the meetings.

We simply have too much land. This month, the Board will vote on the recommendation that we sell some or all of our Camp properties. The likelihood of selling them all is remote but it will be "on the table" as it were. It is likely that we will vote to retain one and then actively market the balance. The Board has pledged that some of the proceeds will be invested in the remaining Property or Properties to bring them up to "A" Camp status by BSA National standards.

The approach that we at the Adirondack Foothills District see for retention of a property or properties must be guided by what I would describe as a tri-pod approach. The "legs" are:

- 1. Our current financial situation and program needs;
- 2. The future of the Council and our program needs in the next 20 years; and finally

3. The needs of our constituents...our young men.

All of these factors must be considered. If we leave one out, then the "tri-pod" falls over and both the Council and our constituency will suffer.

We discussed this matter at our December District Committee meeting and I will be voting the decision of my constituency at the Board Meeting.

Any decision we make beyond the status quo is bound to make some of you unhappy. Please understand that this has been a very detailed process and much research has been done and much consideration has been given. As far as I can see, the "sentiment" has been taken out of the equation.

I need and urge each and every one of you to approach whatever decision is reached in the same manner. Do your best to remove sentiment and "...its always been this way" from your approach and your actions. We all have memories about certain camps....but...I believe that if we fail to act, all we will be left is...memories...and many regrets.

So whatever the decision, we want you to stay involved and stay committed to our youth and to the Boy Scouts of America.
